

For the awaited festival now upcoming


The turning of seeds to plants

Spreading happiness and pleasure all over




Book Review

- "That's because no one is born with anger. And when we die the soul is freed of it" (Pg. 150)




And to live a life, as Charles Mackay put it where "I envy nobody - no, not I - And nobody envies me!", is to have a life, larger than itself.

Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj

Chhatrapati Shivaji - a warrior king of Maharashtra and one of the greatest national heroes of Mahadeshwara who was the founder of the Maratha empire. He was born on 19th February 1630 in the Shivneri Fort in Maharashtra. His mother was Jijabai and father was Shivaji Bhosale. He was a great leader who created a a sovereign and independent statein Maharashtra that was based on the welfare of the people, equality to all the faiths and justice. Shivaji had many achievements during his regime. Shivaji was engaged in military career before the age of 20. He captured the fort Toran with the help of mavalis. He also captured forts Sinhagad, Kondana, Chakana Purandar from Adil Shah of Bijapur.

Relation with the Sultan of Bijapur- Shivaji was having military activities against Adil Shah so the Sultan of Bijapur wanted to punish him. He sent Afzal Khan against Shivaji. Shivaji very tactfully killed Afzal Khan and looted his camp. Then in 1661 CE Sultan of Bijapur made good relations with Shivaji and accepted his conquest.

Relation with Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb-Relations of Shivaji and Aurangzeb were also not so good. Shivaji conquered many forts and territories belonging to Aurangzeb. Shivaji had trained his men in guerrilla warfare which enabled him to suddenly attack Aurangzeb's army from behind.

Shivaji's army-His army was his asset. It consisted of peasants of Maratha and Kunbi castes. He knew the limitations of his army and thus adopted guerilla tactics which came to be known as "Ganimi Kawa". He used sudden raids, sweeps, psychological pressure and ambushes as his warfare tactics.

He was called "Mountain Rat" by Aurangzeb.

Shivaji was a man of great qualities. He was an inspiration to others. He was an effective organiser, an efficient military strategist - he knew very well that how to handle the enemies that is why he was able to to face the the armies of the Mughals and the Sultan of Bijapur inspite of having a small size army.

Many of the European writers in their accounts have admired Shivaji for his acts of heroism and cleverness in the use of strategies. He has been compared with Alexander The Great and Julius Caesar. The famous French traveller Francois Bernier in his book "Travels in Mughal India" has described Shivaji as a respectable personality. Marathi social reformer Jyotirao Phule portrayed him as the hero of the shudras and dalits. Indian nationalist leader Lokmanya Tilakportrayed Shivaji as the opponent of the oppressor. M.G. Ranade in his literary work "Rise of the Maratha power" declared Shivaji's achievements as the beginning of modern nation building.

Shivaji is considered a national hero in India, particularly in the state of Maharashtra. His life stories form an integral part in the lives of the people of Maharashtra. It is said that he was the first warrior who had sown the seeds of Indian independence. He was a source of inspiration for the Indian nationalists during the Indian struggle for freedom. Many dominant national parties of India idolize him for his bravery and fearlessness. The legacy of Shivaji continues to thrive within every Indian even after centuries.
